

MEMORABLE SUSTATINER EVENT





SUSTAINER

How long have you been in the League? If you transferred, where and when did you transfer?

Wow, time flies when you're having fun! I have been in JLOC almost 30 years. I became an Active weeks after my now-Leaguer daughter, Annie Brown, was born in 1983.

What is your current placement?

I am the Sustaining Advisor for the Fundraising Council, which is led by my daughter-in-law, Kristi Leonard.

What is the first sign of the holidays?

With a family the size of ours, I start Christmas shopping when temperatures are still in the triple digits - but we won't count that as a real sign of the holidays. I'd have to say the big "family tree event" is the real start of Christmas in our home. When my kids were young, I felt they could only handle so much holiday anticipation before chaos set in, so we did not decorate until twelve days before Christmas. Grandparents joined us for a dinner of spiced cider and Christmas cookies, lights were strung, songs were sung, and the homemade glitter angel made it to the top of the tree. Now I allow the decorating to begin a bit earlier in December, but the big family tree tradition continues with all my kids and grandkids, and luckily my mom too, returning to trim the Christmas tree. And the same homemade glitter angel makes it to the top of the tree!

What holiday do you like decorating for the most? Christmas, of course!

CHOCOLATE CHOW MEIN

- 1 (12-oz.) package Nestle
- 2 (12-oz.) packages Nestle
- 1 (6-oz.) bag chow mein no
- 1 cup cashews, coarsely chopped (use a bit more, if you like)



Melt chocolate and butterscotch chips together. (Do this either over very low heat in a saucepan, stirring constantly OR in a microwave oven, according to the Nestle package instructions for melting chips.)

Add chopped nuts and chow mein noodles to melted chips and gently stir until all is well-coated, allowing mixture to cool slightly while mixing. Then drop by teaspoon onto waxed paper. The cookies will look somewhat like little chocolate haystacks. Allow to fully setup, at least 4 hours or overnight. These cookies store very well in a covered container, away from heat.

We have several family favorites, but this cookie recipe is the very favorite of my sons, Ran, Cooper, Carson and Zane. It is easy and yummy and I have made it every Christmas for even more years than I have been in JLOC.

What is your favorite holiday tradition?

We have two holiday traditions that have continued from the time my children were little, and I don't think I can choose -- they truly are both my favorites. The first is our tree-trimming party, resulting in the most beautiful Christmas tree in the world. Well -- the most beautiful to ME, anyway! It is full of ornaments made by our children and grandchildren through the years, glitter and cotton balls, construction paper chains, glued gold macaroni --- mixed in with ornaments that belonged to grandparents and others that hung on beautiful trees in years past. My other favorite tradition is that I am very blessed that our whole family gathers together at our home on Christmas morning. And Santa comes to our house... and leaves goodies under the tree and in the stockings for everyone!

What was your all-time favorite gift you GAVE and to whom did you give it?

When I was an Active, my family "adopted" another family one Christmas through the League and a community aid agency; it was a grandmother raising her two small grandchildren. The agency noted that the grandmother was without a coat on the cold day she came to seek gifts for the children. Along with the usual grocery and child things, I got her a coat and gave it to her to try on when I delivered the gifts. She cried when she realized she had a new coat. as she had left her old coat on a city bus and never found it. To this day, it is the most memorable gift I have ever given.

The end result is always a tree that's a little bit lopsided, but is unique every year and looks like a family tree. As my siblings and I have gotten older and moved out, this is still a tradition that we've kept up and I can't imagine a Christmas without it. (Did my mom answer the same thing? =)

What was your all-time favorite gift you GAVE and to whom did you give it?

Every year I try to come up with a challenge, like all gifts will be purchased locally, or everything will be handmade. A few years ago my challenge was to buy books for everyone in my family, which meant books for 12 people. At first this was actually an easy challenge because we are all big readers, but picking out just the right book(s) for each person wasn't as easy as I thought. But digging through bookshelf after bookshelf for just the perfect book became a fun challenge and I ended up finding the perfect book for each family member. Not the most exciting gifts, but any gift that feels like it's picked out just for you, is always a good one to me.

What is your favorite holiday memory?

Growing up in a big family is great, especially around holidays. My favorite memory is decorating cookies at my grandmother's house when I was little. All the Aunts and girl cousins would gather in the kitchen and the adults would bake while the kids would decorate. As my grandmother aged and eventually became ill, the tradition was put on hold for a few years. Thankfully, it was recently revived and now the girl cousins (who are all now adults) have taken over the tradition. We still use my grandmother Betty's recipe and cookie cutters and decorate them as if we're little kids again.



BETTY BROWN'S SUGAR COOKIES

- 1 cup butter
- 2 tsp. baking power
- 2 eggs
- 3 3/4 4 cups flour
- 1/4 cup crea
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups suga



Cream 1 cup sugar with the butter in an electric mixer. Add the eggs one at a time, beating until incorporated and everything is light and fluffy. Add in remaining cup of sugar. Add the dry ingredients, then the cream, and finally, the vanilla. Form dough into discs and wrap with plastic wrap. Refrigerate for several hours, or over night. When ready to bake, preheat oven to 350 degrees. Roll the dough out very thin and cut with cookie cutters. Bake for 8-12 minutes or until edges are slightly brown and golden. Cookies should be thin and just slightly crisp. Top with your favorite icing.

CRAB AND SHRIMP ETOUFEE

1/4 cup butte

- 2 tbsp. olive oil
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flou
- 1/4 cup chopped celery
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 2/3 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green onions
- 1/4 cup chopped green bell peppe
- I tbsp. chopped fresh parsley
- 1 (14-oz.) can chicken bro
- 1/3 cup dry white wine
- 1 tbsp. low-sodium Creole seasoning
- 1 tbsp. tomato paste
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sa
- 1/2 tsp. hot sauce
- 5 cups hot cooked long-grain rice
- 2 lbs. unpeeled, medium-size raw shri
- 1 (16-oz.) container fresh crabmeat, drained and flaked

Peel shrimp (devein, if desired). Melt butter with oil in a large Dutch oven over medium-high heat; stir in flour and cook, stirring constantly, 5 minutes or until caramel colored. Add chopped onion, green pepper, and celery; cook, stirring constantly, 4 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add minced garlic, and sauté 1 minute.

Stir in chicken broth, white wine, and next 6 ingredients, and cook, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes. Add shrimp. Cover, reduce heat, and simmer, stirring occasionally, 5 minutes. Stir in crabmeat; cook, stirring often, until thoroughly heated and serve over rice.

My sister and I made a scrapbook for my parents. We each wrote letters to them expressing our gratitude for such wonderful parents. It was awesome to see the look on my mom's face.




What is your favorite holiday memory?

Kids in the Kitchen

he goal of the Junior Leagues' Kids in the Kitchen initiative, which is supported by

The Association of Junior Leagues International, Inc. and its member Leagues, is to empower youth to make healthy lifestyle choices and help reverse the growth of childhood obesity and its associated health issues. " While the JLOC's Kids in the Kitchen event started out as an annual event, first in partnership with schools for Healthy Lifestyles and then in partnership with the Boys and Girls club, the project was transitioned into a traditional placement for the 2011-2012 placement year. Locally, Nicole Dobbins, Sara Sweet and Jamie Maddy were instrumental in bringing this new monthly placement to fruition. Through the annual event, children were educated about healthy snacks that they could prepare at home. Now, in the monthly placement, JLOC is broadening

the horizon by adding a physical activity component and a journaling activity where the children draw/write responses to a health topic that the volunteers pose each month.

In July, over 80 children participated in the event held at the Boys and Girls Club of OKC. They assembled cheese and apple sailboats while learning about protein-rich foods from animals that provide an energy source for the future and carbohydrate-rich plant based foods that provide energy for "right now." They learned that by pairing these foods together in a snack, they will feel fuller longer by satisfying their immediate hunger and providing a reserve for later. After their snack, the children were excited to dance the "cupid shuffle" led by monthly leaders Sabrina Froehlich and Natalie Carns.

In another event held on Sept. 19, Jamie Meltzner led the lesson and taught the kids about the importance of reading

nutritional labels and learning proper serving sizes. The night began with a short workout before having the kids break into small groups. After a quick lesson on reading labels, the kids used their new knowledge to read the label on a box of Cheerios. They were also given a ³/₄ cup measuring cup to take home, which indicated the proper serving size of the cereal. Jamie said the activity went well and she believes the kids learned valuable information that they can use at home and hopefully share with others.

The current project manager, Rachel Bell, is passionate about childhood nutrition. She majored in Nutritional Sciences as an undergrad and received certification as a Registered Dietitian and worked for several years as a clinical dietitian. She has since decided to pursue a career in metabolic research. When asked what gets her so excited about the opportunity to lead the first annual placement for Kids in the Kitchen, Rachel said "the most rewarding experience is when a child begins to understand that a healthy lifestyle is not a chore, but a gift that they can choose for themselves, and that they can motivate their family to do the same".

Rachel and JLOC members have plenty of fun activities planned in upcoming months at the Boys and Girls Club.

Uniquely ME!

unior League is partnering with the Girl Scouts of Western Oklahoma to offer Uniquely ME! Uniquely ME! is a program that was designed by Dove and Girl Scouts to address the critical nationwide problem of low self-esteem among adolescent and pre-adolescent girls. The program is four weeks long and the curriculum is provided by the Girl Scouts of Western Oklahoma. The Junior League members lead the class and the activities each week. Lessons include recognizing one's strengths and best attributes, handling peer pressure, healthy eating habits, exercise, and identifying core values and personal interests. Additional information about eating disorders, the power of positive thinking, relationship, and stress is also available to girls, on an age-appropriate basis.

Chelsey Raley has volunteered for two sessions and has had a great experience. She said, "There were definitely some girls that you could tell were observing what you were saying and really processing the ideas that we were suggesting. They seemed to respond well when we broke down into small groups, and on a few occasions really asked some difficult questions that you could tell they were struggling with. Fortunately, we had a wonderful group of JL girls to respond and offer advice to the girls."

Uniquely ME! project manager, Ellen Pogemiller, has worked closely with the Girl Scout staff and was able to lead one class. The class focused on our strengths and values. At the end of the class, the girls were asked to create a superhero. All of the superheroes were female and they all exuded the characteristics of a Junior League woman – strong,



smart, resourceful and kind.

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
