- 3 limes
- cilantro
- Greek yogurtolive oil (for



Living In A Reality World

An Inside Look from Bachelor Contestant Jennifer Fritsch



rom being a part of the 2011-2012 Provisional class to being a part of 25 eligible women on the Bachleor, Jennifer

Fritsch has experienced it all in one short year. Here is a behind the scenes look into one of televisions most popular reality shows.

How and when did you learn you would be a contestant on

the Bachelor? I filled out the online application in January 2011. I thought nothing of it....I sent an email out to my girlfriends saying "I guess we will see...." Three months later a casting director called me and asked if I was still single. I completed an extensive background check and once that cleared I sent in a video of basically a day in my life, what I'm looking for in someone, what my perfect date would be, etc. They received it, liked it and asked me to come to the Dallas casting call. I missed the first Provisional Course to go! I came back from that and 2 days later I was informed that they wanted me to come to LA for a weekend....that was the first week in August. They proceeded to send me a 100 plus page contract....talk about overwhelming. I was considering backing out at that point but my family convinced me otherwise and that I could count on their support no matter what! I found out "officially" maybe 3 weeks prior to leaving in early September. It was an incredibly long process and when I was sitting on the plane on my way to begin filming I still couldn't believe it was actually

happening...was I really doing this!

What was a typical day like? The only thing that was ever typical about our day was that we woke up with Bloody Mary's and Mimosas', that we did our nails every single day, and that we went to the gym...no joke. Cameras are there as early or as late as they need to be depending on what's happening, which sometimes meant as late as 3 am and back again as early as 7 am. Everything changed day to day depending on whether it was a One-on-One Date, a Group Date, a Rose Ceremony, or a Travel day. If you weren't filming "reality" you were most likely doing interviews....you do an interview for everything ... pre-date, mid-date, postdate, pre-rose, mid-rose, after-rose, and the dreaded exit. The interviews became an outlet and were rather comforting in Park City I sat in an interview chair for almost 3 hours and when I walked out of the interview with a renewed self-confidence and somewhat puffy eyes, I realized the producer never said anything to me except "how are you feeling today?"

What did you think when Ben said you were the best kisser? I was flattered, but at the same time thought, "so you've kissed us all?"

What are the dynamics in the house like? There were girls that got along and girls that didn't, but no one was ever blatantly rude to anyone...that is with the exception of Samantha and/ or Courtney. I saved all my sarcastic

and possibly rude comments for my interviews that luckily you never saw, but to a certain extent that is what everyone did. We all HAD to live together so we tried to make it work the best we could! The only time the dynamics would really change would be when someone went home...depending on who it was of course. Jaclyn and I were really close so when she went home in San Francisco, I had to reach out to some of the other girls that I did not know as well. I know when I went home it was really hard for Emily because we had become close as well...roommates, work-out partners, teammates on the Blue Team, and each other's sounding boards. All relationships form fast in Bachelor time.

Can you talk about your one on one date with Ben? It was truly a perfect date for me from beginning to end. I know that sounds cheesy, but it gave me a chance to be in my element and actually show him what I was all about. The crater diving was fun and nothing I expected my date to be! My only issue with that portion of the date was that I had to wear the worst outfit in Bachelor history a couple weeks prior (the weasel costume) then they go and put me in a bathing suit and a harness! I am a woman that loves adventure and believes that if you have to sign a release form to do it then that must mean it's worth it and that it was (despite my wardrobe)! The evening portion of the date was right out of the Bachelor play-book....dinner in the mountains on

a bridge wrapped in twinkling lights and a fire to keep us warm (along with the wine)....we talked about our interests, our family, our relationship history, what our day to day life was like, yes I mentioned Junior League! And then just like in the movies....the lightning came, then the thunder, then the sprinkles.....then the torrential downpour. I remember producers yelling at us to wait it out (we were making a television show for goodness sake)! Finally we ran into an empty ski-lodge where they let me look in the mirror (I was soaked), put a flower on the table, along with plastic wine glasses and kept filming. I got the Rose and Ben told me that the date wasn't over....I immediately "She Won't Be Lonely Long"?! Then the crowd parted again and we went to the front. Clay asked me where I was from and I proudly said "Oklahoma City"! The funny thing about my date was that I had no contact with my family, so my sister and mom were always checking the spoiler websites to see where we were at and if there was any mention of me. Park City posted in the newspaper that they needed volunteers to come to the concert and film for The Bachelor my sister called my mom and told her "we should go....you know it's going to be Jennifer's date!"...they laughed it off and 2 days later the websites reported that "the Redhead from Oklahoma City enjoyed a Clay Walker concert, rose in

thought FIREWORKS (which I love)! By then the rain had finally stopped so we went out and got on the ski lift, yes it was running just for us.....at 11 o'clock at night....and again the Bachelor play-book...every single ski lift had a lantern on it so we could see them all the way down and as they passed by us on the way up. But as we got closer to the bottom I saw flashing lights.... then I heard music....we hopped off the lift and ran towards the crowd.....they parted and we ran up to a platform right in the middle. CLAY WALKER!!!!! Ben and I started dancing and at one point he said to me "you know the words". Hello?! Who doesn't know the words to

hand. Can you explain the rose

ceremony Process? Rose ceremony days are the longest ever....especially in the beginning of the season. Nothing dramatic happens in Bachelor time until it is dark outside and if all the interviews are done we just sit around and wait or film "reality"! This season we were freezing because several times it really was freezing. The first Rose Ceremony was freezing and ended at dawn, roosters were crowing. The Rose Ceremony in Sonoma was actually outside and it was 40 degrees! The Rose Ceremony in San Fran was also outside...cold and had just got done raining! Then in Park City the Rose Ceremony was inside but they opened the doors behind us and it was snowing! I couldn't have been happier for the Rose Ceremony in Puerto Rico....that is until I went home that night.

What's with all the helicopter

rides? This is actually pretty funny..... from what I heard Ashley Herbert was terrified of helicopters so it was Ben's way of throwing it back at her. (Could that have been a warning sign?) He wanted to have as many as possible throughout the season. What is even more funny is that on my application it was all about HELICOPTERS!!! I didn't care what we did, where we went...I just wanted to get there by helicopter! Unfortunately though I never got the opportunity....the closest I came was at the baseball game, but as you all know my team lost!

Based off your observations, did you anticipate Ben proposing to Courtney? Once I got home and was

able to actually clear my head (it took a solid month or longer), settle back into my real life without anyone knowing what I had just been through, and deal with being rejected (eventually publicly) there was absolutely no way I thought he would propose to Courtney. Right about that time promos started airing and I was seeing things that I had no idea had happened....yes, I am talking about the skinny-dipping...I completely did a 180 and was confident that Courtney was exactly who he was going to propose to! Of course, I would have much rather it been Nicki, Emily, or Kacie B. because those girls were genuine, but looking back now I am glad he didn't because they deserve so much better!

Have you kept in contact with any of the other contestants?

This experience didn't turn out the way I wanted it to, but looking back now I realize it turned out exactly how it was supposed to. The friends I made will forever be a part of my life....Jaclyn and I talk daily....and I have kept in contact with Nicki, Emily, and Elyse.

Knowing what you know now would you do it again? I wouldn't trade the once in a lifetime experience I had or the people I met for anything.... but NO I wouldn't do it again!

When did you launch your blog? I launched the blog a little over a year ago.

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DI – FEBRUARY 2012

Everything is bigger in Texas, so the saying goes. That held true for the Association of Junior Leagues International's Organizational Development Institute (ODI), Feb. 10-12 in Ft. Worth, Texas, as more than 400 women gathered for the largest ODI in AJLI's history. The crowd wasn't the only thing that was big, though. Ideas, inspiration and new connections grew throughout the weekend. ODI offers development for emerging leaders in Junior Leagues throughout the world. Denise Cramer and myself were honored to be selected to attend. We could choose from five tracks: community impact, building internal capacity, fund development, new strategies for nominating, and membership development. Denise selected membership development, as she is the incoming Advising Mentor co-chair. I chose community impact as I will be serving on next year's board of directors as we examine and assess our focus area. Denise and I would convene after each session, excitedly sharing what we had learned and found a renewed sense of how the membership and community impact are intrinsically connected. One of the first things our community impact

presenter, Vicki Clark, told us was if we don't want to learn anything to get out of the League. If our members have not learned or transformed in some way through their experience during the year, we have not succeeded. She recommended asking members what they had learned - about the League, the mission, themselves - at the end of each year.


"You can't build charity outside of the league if you can't build it inside. Meet people where they are and utilize the talents of your members, even if they are Provisionals or Sustainers. Instead of hours, tell them what they will experience," said Clark.

She added we needed to get members to "feel" the League. We make time for what we value. We should approach our focus considering not just the impact we can make on the community in that area, but also the impact we can make by engaging and training our members as effective volunteers. Clark also delivered the Saturday plenary session on moving toward diversity and inclusion in our membership.

"Building inclusive Leagues means creating

environments where every member feels equally welcomed and included," Clark said. She continued that diversity leads to productivity and creativity and appeals to the next generation of leaders, which we need to be ready to actively recruit. She cited that many Leagues, including the Dallas League, have a Diversity and Inclusion committee to assess, develop and implement initiatives to enhance their membership. One look around the room, though, showed the diversity among the women from our 292 Leagues worldwide - women with a shared vision of impacting their community. Denise and I both made meaningful connections with our fellow delegates. We found common ground and fresh ideas. I even found a gal from the Indianapolis League whom I worked with more than 10 years ago at the Fox affiliate in Evansville, Ind.! And Denise and I - who were friends before - found out just how similar our senses of humor are which added to the fun of the weekend. These connections - with members near and far - are the very fabric of the Junior League, filling us with the motivation needed to achieve community impact.



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A Year of Juggling

Q&A WITH PRESIDENT WHITNEY TERO

Why did you decide to become

President? After my first term on the board serving as Administrative Vice President, I had a few different people that I respected greatly mention to me that I should apply/interview for the position of President. I hadn't really ever even considered it to be a remote possibility, or given it any thought until then. I'm so glad I took their advice.

Explain the role of the JLOC

President? I could cut and paste from the President's job description in Policies and Procedures, but I won't because even though that outlines what the President is responsible for ultimately, it doesn't adequately summarize what one does while serving in this role. You are the CEO and COO of a non-profit corporation with assets in excess of three million dollars. You are the captain of the ship. You are responsible for the day to day operations of the organization (with the help of a myriad of amazing women), and you are responsible to a membership of more than 1400 volunteers.

What does it take to get the job

done? The President should be passionate about, and have a true commitment to our mission, vision, focus, and our membership. It is important to have a sense of humor, and try not to sweat the small stuff. Being organized is also absolutely mandatory. A support system in and out of the League is also a requisite to be successful at this job, I believe. I know it has been vitally important to me.

f you are looking for a new placement for next year that offers an opportunity to make a dif-

ference in the community, and fits easily into a busy schedule, as it is a Saturday placement, consider volunteering with the Knowledge is Power Program, also known as "KIPP."

KIPP is a national network of openenrollment, college preparatory public schools. KIPP prepares students in underserved communities for success in college and life. There are currently 109 KIPP schools across the nation serving more than 32,000 students. In 2002, Tracy McDaniel founded Oklahoma City's very own KIPP school called "KIPP Reach." KIPP Reach offers grades five through eigth with enrollment of nearly 300 students. Its campus is located near NE 16th Street and Martin Luther King Avenue.

Each month, JLOC members offer a mentoring session for the kids enrolled at KIPP Reach. The sessions cover a variety of different topics like leadership styles, etiquette, interview skills, personal branding, and financial literacy. Earlier this year, Junior League members Emily Campbell and Alex Haygood organized the January session. The topic was health and wellness – an important and increasingly relevant life skill. Students started the morning with ZUMBA® and kickboxing classes. They showed off their dancing skills and high kicks, the Junior League members, well ... we did a really good job keeping up. During the second half of the morning, we taught the students how to decode nutrition labels and how to make a mouth-watering black bean salsa - an inexpensive snack filled with fiber, pro-

tein and loads of vitamins.

KIPP students are off-the-charts impressive. They are intelligent, thoughtful, and incredibly respectful. They eagerly raise their hands to ask and answer questions, they listen intently, and most memorably, they take time at the end of each Junior League session to stand up one at a time and say thank you, specifically mentioning the things they enjoyed. For example, after our session on business etiquette, we gave students each a pack of "thank you" notes to use. Each month, we have received several of those notes written by the students, thanking us for our time. It's a small touch that lets us know we are making an impact in the community. Book Project

his year our Book Project, formerly known as the Book Drive, is transforming into less of a book drive and more of a collaborative library project with Citizens Caring for Children (CCC). In previous years, the Book Drive partnered with Bank of Oklahoma, Tate Publishing, and Metro Transit to provide thousands of books to children and adults in our community. This year, we are developing a new partnership with Citizens Caring for Children (the Book Project) and will still be partnering with Bank of OK, Tate, and Metro Transit as well. We have worked with CCC on other projects, such as Back to School, where school supplies are provided to foster children.

CCC serves foster children from birth to 21 years of age in Oklahoma County as well as other surrounding counties. These children are removed from their homes, often due to abuse and/or neglect, with only the clothes on their backs. CCC provides them with new clothing, shoes, toiletries, and books. CCC serves 150-200 kids per month providing them with 2 books each. CCC has a book nook, called the B.E.A.R (Being Excited About Reading) cave, for the children to read and play.


This year League volunteers have the opportunity to help CCC rebuild the B.E.A.R. Cave. Volunteers will help stock, sort and create a well-organized library, as well as re-decorate and re-organize the layout to provide more floor space. The director of CCC has put together a "wish list" for the space that includes approximately 5,000 books, a cabinet to organize the gaming systems and AV equipment, bean bag chairs and a painted wall mural for the children to enjoy.

The Bank of Oklahoma has graciously donated \$1,800 to help purchase books, supplies, paint and furniture. In the past, BOK has collected books from the community with drop off sites at their branch locations which league members would collect and sort. This year, BOK has set up a volunteer opportunity with their employees to donate money and/or books from a list provided by CCC.

JLOC will have a "League" book drive to collect new and gently used books, with drop off locations at the Remarkable Shop, Headquarters and other business locations. We will also gather donated books from Tate Publishing to distribute to CCC, churches, other non-profits and will still participate in the Metro Transit event. Book Project volunteers will also work closely with the grant writing committee to obtain additional money to support out literacy campaign and fund our project.

In the past, this was a summer intensive project beginning in June and ending in mid August. However, we have been asked by our partnering agencies to begin immediately so the B.E.A.R. cave will be completed by the end of June, which is before the back to school project begins in August. The project will end with the Metro Transit event downtown at the bus station, which usually occurs on a Friday morning from 7-10am. BOK will help league members transport the books, and will have their mascot Will Readmore present at the event. This is a required event for all project volunteers.

BOK will be announcing their involvement in May during National Book Week, and Fox 25 will be covering BOK's involvement in this project on May 10. Book Project volunteers will have a flexible schedule to complete the library, as volunteers have been requested by the CCC on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday. Remember, even if you are not on the Book Project, you can still show your support by donating books at one of the JLOC book drop off locations over the next couple months. Thank you to all of our Book Project volunteers who will help make the Book Project a success this year!

New Placements Opportunities in the League

machi-The goal of this project is to match JLOC volunteers up with a Little Sister to mentor throughout the school year. All Little Sisters chosen for the Amachi program will have an incarcerated parent. JLOC volunteers will talk with the "Littles" about their classes, do homework, read together or play on the playground. The goal of the program is to build trust and a friendship and expose the children in the program to new opportunities and options. During the academic year, volunteers will meet one-on-one during the school day once a week for approximately an hour at one of the 4 local schools, Arbor Grove Elementary, Tulakes Elementary,

Green-wood Elementary, and Orvis Risner.

Whiz Kids- The mission of City Care's Whiz Kids program is to improve the well being of inner city youth through academic tutoring and positive mentoring relationships as well as communicating spiritual and moral values. As part of the League's participation in this program, JLOC volunteers work with 1st-3rd graders to develop age appropriate reading skills. Regular sessions occur during the evenings during the OKC school year (August-May) at various churches around Oklahoma City.

Reading Rainforest- Saturdays this summer, beginning June 9th, join JLOC as we debut our new project: Reading Rain-

forest! On location in downtown Oklahoma City's newly updated Myriad Gardens, Reading Rainforest will inform and inspire children of all ages. Each week, volunteers will welcome elementary-aged guests (and their parents:) into the Botanical Garden for a themed story time and craft as well as a tour of the beautifully verdant Garden. We'll discover plants from around the world, walk among butterflies, and learn a few new ways to live "green." Guests will be invited to enjoy the outdoor Children's Garden and play area, including the supercool walk-through fountain (especially on those really hot days!). Reading Rainforest will meet each Saturday from 10 a.m.-Noon. Come join us!
