ow, the summer has flown by! It has been a busy time as the members of our new Provisional class have diligently worked at the Remarkable Shop. The Book Drive project, led by Lisa McConnell had its most successful year ever with more than 21,000 books collected! In addition to the traditional collecting of books for the Book Drive, the committee also applied for several grants through First Book. As a result, JLOC received over 600 new, hard-cover children's books. The Wild Storytime at the Zoo project, led by Rebecca Holmboe saw 900 children despite the intense heat. The children really enjoyed being able to ask a zookeeper questions and pick out a book after turning in their Eager Reader cards. The Back to School project, led by Macie Craven-Liles has seen nearly 370 kids with an estimated 20% increase from last year - giving us a total of 700 foster children that will receive backpacks filled with school supplies. Job well done ladies! You are making an amazing impact on our community.

Mistletoe Market is quickly approaching. Katie Moore, Mistletoe Market Chair, and the rest of the Market Board have been working tirelessly to make this year's Market the most successful ever. We are so excited about our new venue at the Cox Convention Center downtown. We will host our Preview Party on Thursday, October 13th, and Market will conclude on Sunday, October 16th.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the September General Membership Meeting. It is a great opportunity to catch up with friends, pick-up your Mistletoe Market shirt and tickets, get your Black Book, and hear important updates and information. xciting Change!!!! For the first time since its beginning, Mistletoe Market is moving loca-

tions!! This year Mistletoe Market will be held at the Cox Convention Center in downtown Oklahoma City!! Market chair Katie Moore and her board our thrilled about the move and the many exciting opportunities it brings for the future growth of Mistletoe Market! Thankfully, Katie was able to find a few minutes and answer questions about the upcoming Mistletoe Market.

When did you start working on Mistletoe Market?

We started working on Mistletoe Market 2011 before Market 2010 was complete. Knowing there was the potential for a change in venues, we had to jump right in and get to work.

What can you tell us about the new venue for Mistletoe Market?

The Cox Convention Center located at 1 Myriad Gardens, Oklahoma City, OK is a perfect venue for the scale of show that Mistletoe Market has grown to be...and provides plenty of room for growth in future years! This year we will have more square footage for vendor booths because the exhibit hall provides us with additional space for important aspects of Market, including vendor hospitality, a more focused entrance to Market that will allow us to better manage the flow of shoppers purchasing tickets and entering the show, and a large concession area where shoppers can have a snack and rest and ready themselves for more shopping. Shoppers and volunteers will love the convenient access to clean restrooms.



Besides the location what is new about the market this year?

Market 2011 will unveil some new Special Events that are sure to only add to the fun of our annual tradition... I would love to let readers know that Born in November/C+ will be performing at the Preview Party on Thursday, October 13th. Be watching the Monday JLOC e-mails for other Market special events, including a Happy Hour on Friday, October 14th.

Do you believe parking will be an issue since the location is downtown?

While parking will be different than it has been in the past for Market, we don't foresee it being a major issue. There are countless spaces located below the Cox Convention Center that will allow shoppers easy access to their cars rain or shine (or snow or wind or any other Oklahoma weather condition that could arise). In addition, there are many surface level lots located around the Cox building, as well as parking garages near by.

What can you tell us about tickets?

Yes, ticket prices will remain the same. JLOC Active and Provisional members will be required to purchase quota tickets for \$30 (this includes 6 tickets to Market) - we encourage our members to either give out or sell these tickets! General admission tickets are \$8 per day. Senior Citizen (55+) and Children (2 years and under) are \$5 per day. Coupons for \$1 off the price of admission will be available in local publications and also distributed prior to and during Market around

town. We are working with The Race for the Cure to get coupons in the race participant's bags.

When will the shift times be available online to sign up?

Shift sign up will begin at 6:00 am (CST) on Wednesday, September 14. A list of shifts available for sign up will be posted to the JLOC members-only website on Thursday, September 1. Please watch the Monday Emails for additional information. We will explain the process for signing up at the September General Meeting as well.

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



What do you like most about Fall?


I love Fall because of football! And I think this Fall will be especially nice after our long summer here.

Record Setting Book Drive

his year's JLOC Book Drive was a huge success with more than 21,000 books collected!

The Book Drive is essential to helping JLOC accomplish it's focus of "Changing Lives Through Literacy".

The Book Drive ran through the month of June and collected books for all ages. Books were collected at JLOC Headquarters, the Remarkable Shop, Barnes & Noble, Metro transit, and all area BOK locations.

Every year, Bank of Oklahoma offers a generous \$1500 donation to the League to purchase books. Other partners include Barnes and Noble, Fox News, Tate Publsihing, and Metro Transit. In addition to providing locations for collecting the books, our partners also offer extensive marketing and promotions of the Book Drive. Their on-going support of the Junior League and our literacy focus is a tremendous influence on the Book Drive's success.

The majority of all of the books went to JLOC projects, allowing project

managers to use their funds on additional supplies. In June and July, JLOC project managers had the opportunity to review and select new books for their projects. In addition to the traditional method of collecting books for the Book Drive, the committee also applied for several grants through First Book.

A large portion also went directly to our community partners who needed books to help start or fill their libraries. In June, Tate Publishing donated thousands of religious-themed books. Because many non-profits cannot use




books with religious themes, the Book Drive committee reached out to area churches and organized a viewing and selection event. Over 30 churches and non-profit agencies attended the weekend event and collected thousands of books to use and distribute in their programs throughout our community.

The committee will distribute the remaining books to the community at the Metro Transit bus terminal on Friday, August 12 from 7 - 10 am. In years past, books were given to hundreds of people who attended this event and wanted the

opportunity to collect free books.

The JLOC Book Drive has made a significant impact to "Change Lives Through Literacy". Examples of a few area programs that have benefitted from JLOC's Book Drive:

- Programs focusing on foster children;
- Programs helping children work through and deal with grief;
- A non-profit that works with improving literacy rates with lower-socioeconomic families;



he Junior League has teamed with Citizen's Caring for Children to host the Back to School shopping event benefiting foster children for a number of years now. We, JLOC, are able to provide the children backpacks, books, and a large variety of school supplies that otherwise may be unavailable to them. This year we expect to serve around 700 children and were blown away by the opening day response. Additionally, the volunteers leave with some pretty touching and memorable moments themselves.
